What is permaculture?



Permaculture uses ecological principles to integrate food and energy production, shelter, and community development. Its aim is the creation of sustainable human settlements that are harmoniously woven into the environment and that have the diversity, stability, and resilience of natural ecosystems.

The instructors:



Toby Hemenway is the author of *Gaia's Garden: A Guide to Home-Scale Permaculture*, for the last six years the best-selling permaculture book in the world. He is Scholar-in-Residence at Pacific University, adjunct Professor of Graduate Education at Portland State University, and Field Director for the Permaculture Institute (USA). Guests will include local experts and some of the best-known permaculture teachers in the country.



The course is especially useful for homeowners, planners, design professionals, community organizers, farmers, and gardeners. It is adapted to a wide variety of learning styles and is presented via lecture, images, video, group discussion, exercises, and design projects. Course graduates will receive a permaculture design certificate from the Permaculture Institute (USA).
